Each has a separate history, separate associations, and separate scientific journals (i.e., *Cultural Diversity and Ethnic Minority Psychology* and the *Journal of Cross-Cultural Psychology*) and conventions, and each subscribes to different philosophical orientations. Cross-cultural psychology has had a longer interest in methodological and measurement challenges, whereas racial and ethnic minority psychology is more oriented toward political advocacy and social justice and social change--Introduction.
