Their involvement can draw media attention and resources to causes, increasing public awareness and pressure on policymakers. Examples include actors supporting climate change initiatives and musicians advocating for racial equality.

## CRITIQUES OF CELEBRITY POLITICAL INFLUENCE

## ENTERTAINMENT-EDUCATION STRATEGIES

Some political messaging leverages entertainment formats to educate the public about policies and social issues. This approach, known as entertainment-education, uses storytelling and relatable characters to foster awareness and motivate behavioral change, proving effective in areas like public health and civic engagement.
