COMMON WORDS FOR SWORD

SEVERAL COMMONLY USED JAPANESE TERMS FOR SWORDS INCLUDE:

- **KATANA** (刀) A TRADITIONAL CURVED, SINGLE-EDGED SWORD USED BY SAMURAI.
- **KEN** (剣) A DOUBLE-EDGED SWORD, OFTEN REPRESENTING THE CLASSICAL OR CEREMONIAL SWORD.

THE CHARACTER 剣 (KEN OR TSURUGI) COMBINES THE ELEMENTS FOR "SWORD" AND "WEAPON," EMPHASIZING ITS MARTIAL SIGNIFICANCE. THESE CHARACTERS

NOT ONLY CONVEY THE OBJECT BUT ALSO ITS CULTURAL STATUS AND HISTORICAL USE.

TYPES OF JAPANESE SWORDS

JAPANESE SWORDS COME IN VARIOUS FORMS, EACH WITH DISTINCT CHARACTERISTICS SUITED TO DIFFERENT COMBAT NEEDS AND SOCIAL CONTEXTS. THESE TYPES ARE RECOGNIZED BOTH BY THEIR SHAPE AND INTENDED USE, AND THEIR NAMES ARE ESSENTIAL VOCABULARY IN THE SWORD IN JAPANESE LANGUAGE.

KATANA

WAKIZASHI

THE WAKIZASHI IS A SHORTER SWORD USUALLY PAIRED WITH THE KATANA, FORMING THE DAISHO, WHICH MEANS "BIG-LITTLE." IT SERVED AS A BACKUP WEAPON OR FOR CLOSE-QUARTER COMBAT AND SYMBOLIZED THE SAMURAI'S SOCIAL STATUS.

TANTO

THE TANTO IS A DAGGER-LIKE SWORD, SHORTER THAN THE WAKIZASHI. IT WAS OFTEN USED AS A UTILITY KNIFE OR IN CLOSE COMBAT SITUATIONS. TANTO BLADES VARY IN LENGTH BUT ARE TYPICALLY UNDER 12 INCHES.

OTHER VARIANTS

ADDITIONAL TYPES INCLUDE:

- **NODACHI/ODACHI:** VERY LONG SWORDS USED ON THE BATTLEFIELD.
- **CHOKUTO:** STRAIGHT, SINGLE-EDGED BLADES FROM EARLIER PERIODS.
- **UCHIGATANA:** THE PREDECESSOR TO THE KATANA, USED IN THE MUROMACHI PERIOD.

HISTORICAL AND CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

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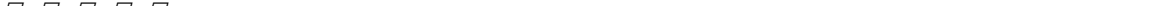

Samurai tells the story of the courageous and highly disciplined fighting men of this time, showing how they evolved from the primitive fighters of the seventh century into an invincible military caste with a fearsome reputation. In the early seventh century, the samurai rose to prominence during the struggles between the emperor and the military leaders (shogun). They took part in the invasion of Korea, as well as helping to keep Japan free from foreign influence. From the Heian period through to the Onin wars, the history of the samurai is replete with tales of heroism and bloodshed. Although the samurai is most famous for his use of the sword, he also used a wide variety of other weapons,

such as the crossbow, the dagger and the spear. Samurai armour and costume were constantly evolving, and by the twelfth century most samurai were wearing the box-like yoroi armour. Samurai examines samurai fighting tactics, as well as acts such as ritual suicide (hari-kiri) and the taking of enemy heads as trophies.

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
