Issues in higher education are still raced from white perspectives and suffer from a view that race and racism occur in a vacuum. Some literature suggests that racism begins very early in the student experience and continues all the way to college (Berlak & Moyenda). This mis-education, mislabeling and

mistreatment based on race often develops as early as five to ten years old and "follows" them to postgraduate education and beyond.
